Now give the respondant 24 beans and explain that these represent 24 hours of a **typical day** (from Monday to Friday, excluding holidays, festivals, etc.). Ask the respondant to distribute the 24 beans according to the time spent in each task, starting with sleeping time and then with the activities on which the child spends most of his time. Make sure all 24 beans are allotted. Now ask the respondent to confirm if they represent the child's typical day and allow him/her to reallocate the beans if needed.
